Since 1980, the San Francisco Bay Area Chapter of the National Naval Officers Association (NNOA) has made a commitment to the educational development of youth residing in the San Francisco Bay Area. This contribution involves a number of highly successful programs, including; youth mentoring, academic tutoring, and awarding of financial scholarships to college bound high school seniors.

### Hadwick and Lily Thompson Scholarship Award Criteria

**Eligibility Requirements**: Bay Area high school seniors entering an accredited college or university as a freshman are eligible. You must be a U.S. citizen and have a minimum grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scales (or equivalent). **Please submit your completed package to the address listed below.** Scholarship recipients will be notified in writing.

**Details of Award**: This one-time award aims to grant an ethnic-based scholarship to a student entering college as a freshman. The recipient will be selected and announced in May.

#### Award Amount: \$1000

<u>Package Requirements</u>: You are required to submit the following:

- > A completed application
- An official high school transcript (with school's official seal).
- Two Letter(s) of recommendation from an individual you know, such as a school official (principal, guidance counselor, coach, etc...) or an official from an organization. These letters should address your potential academic performance at the collegiate level. It should also state your relationship to the official and note any noteworthy/significant accomplishments.
- Three Counselor/Teacher Evaluation Form(s). Evaluation forms must be mailed by the individual completing the evaluation directly to NNOA. (It is recommended that you provide a stamped, pre-addressed envelope to individual completing evaluation to expedite mailing of the document).
- A typed 100 to 300-word essay discussing your educational and career goals
- A current photograph (3" x 5" minimum). Photos will not be returned.
- Copy of ACT and SAT results

Failure to submit ALL requested information will result in disqualification. Students submitting incomplete packages will be notified. All qualified applicants will also be notified of eligibility for an NROTC scholarship.

A few months ago, I was playing golf with a new friend, Mrs. Vanita Finney, and we got to talking about our nonprofit organizations; the National Naval Officers Association and the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. During our conversation, we mentioned our personal involvement in upcoming community outreach events that our organizations were hosting – a Teen Expo for Vallejo youth and a crab fest fundraiser hosted by the San Francisco Bay Area (SFBA) Chapter, and quickly came to the conclusion that our two organizations would benefit from joining forces to host these events.

Afterward, I immediately canvassed SFBA/ANSO chapter members to determine if anyone was interested in supporting the teen expo outreach program and was pleased when I received interested from both SFBA and ANSO leadership.

As a result of the subsequent exchange of correspondence, LTJG Joshua Kitenko, USCG and PO3 Kenney, USCGR served on a Boys Workshop panel, LT Michelle Comeaux, USCG served on a Girls Workshop panel, CDR Denise McCallaCreary, USN Retired manned a NROTC table, and CWO Buckley, USCG and CDR Adolph Keyes, USCG Retired attended to support the expo.

After viewing the documentary – Bring Your "A" Game, by Mario Van Peebles, illustrating many of the truths and misconceptions of black males in America, e.g., the notion that high school dropouts can be successful or that the best profession for black males is becoming a ball player, rapper, or hustler – in the Boys Workshop, panelist addressed an audience of students (middle and high school) and accompanying parents. Panelists were asked: (1) to give your story in about 2 minutes or less about the challenges and obstacles in becoming successful as to what you are today, (2) answer questions from the moderator and audience, (3) assist with small group discussions/activity.

The documentary shows the disparity of dropouts between races – whites about 75 percent, Asians about 77 percent, Blacks over 50 percent; with mostly black males dropping out to be placed in prison after turning to a life of crime; and that the prison systems are over-crowded with mostly black men who lack knowledge and/or a proper/decent education. While the documentary warns the black community of the dangers of not having a good education, it also makes an attempt to show the positive effects and benefits of having a good education. In addition, CDR McCallaCreary got the opportunity to communicate with several parents and students who expressed an interest in obtaining a scholarship to the Academy and others who expressed an interest in a military career. She briefed them on the NRTOC program and passed out military literature on various accession programs.

At the conclusion, I have determined that this was an exceptional experience and will ensure we continue to communicate with the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority to provide volunteers at the next Teen Expo. This is exactly the types of partnership we need to fulfill the mission of the National Naval Officers Association.
