

Meet LCDR James Harold "Jim" Haskins, United States Navy Retired. Jim hails from Texarkana, Texas. He was raised by his parents along with nine brothers and two sisters. As a young boy, Jim credits his older siblings for much of his personal development. A graduate of Dunbar High School, Jim recalls that "football" was a "required" staple in his family." In a personal interview, Jim noted that every boy in the household played football.

Jim enlisted in the Navy right out of high school. He had ambitions of getting a football scholarship to attend college, but was afraid he would not make the team. Instead, hearing that he could play football in the Navy and the benefits of the GI bill, Jim decided the Navy was the best place for him. Jim did his Navy job in the day and played football and attended classes at night.

He speaks with great excitement and appreciation about meeting a Navy Petty Officer by the name of Clauson at this first duty station. "Petty Officer Clauson took me under his wing", Jim said and guided me to do all the courses to quickly advance in the Navy. I made rank fast, Jim said ... "plus I had some good Chiefs who beat me up and made me do what I was supposed to do."

While serving in Vietnam, Jim received a letter from his Chief telling him about the Chief Warrant Officer program. At this time, his Army counterparts tried to recruit him but his Navy division officer

encouraged him to apply for the Navy's Warrant program. Jim became eligible to be a Navy Chief Petty Officer and when he was not advanced he decided to apply for the Navy Warrant Officer program. He was a CWO3 when he applied for the Navy's Limited Duty Officer program. Jim was selected and promoted to Lieutenant junior grade in the Supply Corps.

Jim served in various assignments at sea and "loved it." He recalls working alongside then LT Paul Reason, now retired Admiral Paul Reason. As Jim reflected during the interview, he proudly stated "that the Navy is the greatest career in the world and has everything to offer any aspiring young person. The Navy does not ask for experience, the Navy gives it to those who pursue it."

Jim retired after 30 years of service and is now an ordained Deacon. He is very active in the National Naval Officers Association, a non-profit professional sea service organization, Kappa Alpha Psi fraternity and his community. He is married to Ethel Haskins and resides in Oakland, California with his two daughters Lori, Gina and four grandchildren.

# Coast Guard Gym Named After Coast Guard and NFL Hero



For more than 20 years, I played basketball and exercised in the gym at Coast Guard Island, Alameda, California and not once did it ever dawn on me that the gym did not have a name.

Recently, several shipmates met with the Coast Guard Island Community Relations Division to nominate candidates to officially name the gym. Many candidates were considered, and after mouths of discussion and many hours of research, the committee selection is Emlen Tunnell, a former Guardian during the WWII era and National Football League Hall of Famer who played fourteen seasons for the New York Giants and Green Bay Packers during the 1940s and 1950s.

Tunnell served two years in the United States Coast Guard during WWII. While onboard the USS ETAMIN, it was struck by a Japanese torpedo during the Hollandia Operation in the South Pacific on April 27, 1944. During this attack, Tunnell saved a shipmate's life by extinguishing the flames that had enveloped his shipmate with his bare hands, incurring burns to himself. On March 17, 1946, Tunnell saved another shipmate from drowning in the icy waters adjacent to the moorings at Naval Base Argentia, Newfoundland.

The Commanding Officer of the CGC TAMPA, CDR Ralph Jenkins, recommended the Silver Life Saving Award for Tunnell for his outstanding bravery and heroism, but Tunnell was not awarded the metal. However, the Coast Guard Island gym naming committee has resubmitted the citation in hopes of securing the award for him and his family posthumously.

Emlen Tunnell's ties to Coast Guard Island are very strong. He played basketball on Coast Guard Island and was assigned to duty within the 12th Coast Guard District in San Francisco. In this role he was a three sport star who led the 12th District Basketball Team, the Coast Guard Pilots, who played their home games in Alameda to win the West Coast championship. Notably, this was an integrated basketball team, occurring a full three years before Jackie Robinson would break the color barrier in Major League Baseball with the Brooklyn Dodgers. Tunnell would break the color barrier for the New York Giant football team being the first African-American to play for the Giants in 1948 as an undrafted free agent.

He would play football with the Giants until 1958, following his defensive coordinator, Vince Lombardi to the Green Bay Packers, where he would finish his career in 1962, holding the all-time record for interceptions at 79. Shortly after his retirement Tunnell would become the first African American Assistant Coach for the New York Giants. In 1967, he would become the first African American to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Tunnell would continue to be involved with the NFL until his death at the New York Giants training camp in 1975.



Given Mr. Tunnell's exploits both in the Coast Guard and his role during the initial integration of professional sports, the Coast Guard Community Relations Division has approved the proposal for the naming of the Coast Guard Island's Gymnasium in honor of Emlen Tunnell. An official naming ceremony is scheduled to be held March 9th, 2011. The SFBA Chapter of NNOA will host a reception in support of this epic event. *Author: CDR Adolph Keyes, USCG Retired.* 

## The first African-American Coast Guard Cadets

The Coast Guard Academy admitted Jarvis L. Wright into the Corps of Cadets in 1955. He soon later resigned for medical reasons. Since there is not a lot of data on Jarvis Wright, he is typically left out of most historical references to the Coast Guard Academy. In June 1962, Merle James Smith was admitted to the Coast Guard Academy. In June 1966 he became the first African American to graduate. No other Black cadet was admitted until 1964 when London Steverson from Millington, Tennessee and Kenneth Boyd from Leonia. New Jersey were admitted as part of the Class of 1968.



Since 1980, the San Francisco Bay Area Chapter of the National Naval Officers Association (NNOA) has made a commitment to the educational development of youth residing in the San Francisco Bay Area. This contribution involves a number of highly successful programs, including; youth mentoring, academic tutoring, and awarding of financial scholarships to college bound high school seniors.

#### Hadwick and Lily Thompson Scholarship Award Criteria

<u>Eligibility Requirements</u>: Bay Area high school senior entering an accredited college or university during the 2010-2011 academic year are eligible. You must be a U.S. citizen and have a minimum grade point average of 2.5 on a 4.0 scales (or equivalent).

Please submit your completed package to the address listed below no later than 01 April 2011. Scholarship recipients will be notified no later than 07 May 2011.

<u>Details of Award</u>: This one-time award aims to grant an ethnic-based scholarship to a student entering college as a freshman during the 2010-2011 academic year. The recipient will be selected and announced in May 2011.

Award Amount: \$1000

Package Requirements: You are required to submit the following:

- A completed application
- An official high school transcript (with school's official seal).
- Two Letter(s) of recommendation from an individual you know, such as a school official (principal, guidance counselor, coach, etc...) or an official from an organization. These letters should address your potential academic performance at the collegiate level. It should also state your relationship to the official and note any noteworthy/significant accomplishments.
- > Three Counselor/Teacher Evaluation Form(s). Evaluation forms must be mailed by the individual completing the evaluation directly to NNOA. (It is recommended that you provide a stamped, pre-addressed envelope to individual completing evaluation to expedite mailing of the document).
- A typed 100 to 300-word essay discussing your educational and career goals
- A current photograph (3" x 5" minimum). Photos will not be returned.
- Copy of ACT and SAT results

Failure to submit ALL requested information will result in disqualification. Students submitting incomplete packages will be notified. All qualified applicants will also be notified of eligibility for an NROTC scholarship.

# USS Gravely (DDG 107) Commissioned



WILMINGTON, N.C. – The Navy's newest Arleigh Burke class guided-missile destroyer, USS Gravely (DDG 107) was commissioned in Wilmington, N.C., Nov. 20.

The ceremony honored the late Vice Adm. Samuel Lee Gravely, Jr., who achieved many 'firsts' as an officer in the United States Navy. Gravely was the first African American to command a warship (USS Theodore E. Chandler); to command a warship in combat (USS Taussig); to command a major warship (USS Jouett); to attain flag rank; to become a vice admiral; and to command a numbered fleet (3rd Fleet). A crowd of approximately 4,000 attended the commissioning ceremony held at North Carolina State Ports in Wilmington.

# Oakland Youth Outreach Brings Coast Guard Operations Home

ALAMEDA, Calif. – Despite Coast Guard Island's neighboring proximity to Oakland, many local elementary, middle school and high school students are unaware of the Coast Guard's hometown presence. Many more are unfamiliar with what the Coast Guard has to offer in the way of educational and professional opportunities as they progress through academia.

The National Naval Officers Association San Francisco Bay Area Chapter sponsored a group of thirty Fruitvale Elementary students and a small group of Oakland Military Institute (OMI) cadets on a comprehensive tour, Friday January 21, on Coast Guard Island in Alameda. The tour introduced the students to the local Coast Guard in Alameda, its missions, and assets.



The tour began with an introduction to the Coast Guard's law enforcement role and a hands-on demonstration by Coast Guard Training Team West. The training team instructors shared some of the different travel and training opportunities they had enjoyed during their Coast Guard

careers and some of the students were given the opportunity to experience law enforcement restraint techniques first-hand.

The Coast Guard Cutter BERTHOLF returned to homeport from a successful three-month patrol off the coast of South America on November 24, 2010. The students and accompanying chaperones learned about the BERTHOLF's seizure of nearly \$400 million worth of cocaine during their patrol.



Maritime Safety and Security Team (MSST) 91105 provided a static display to the students which included its boats, trailers, and demonstrations of their operational gear and MSST' K-9 team. The students were informed about the MSST's waterborne security mission during the 2010 World Series of Baseball in San Francisco which highlighted the Coast Guard's vast outreach indifferent missions.



The tour wrapped up with a SFBA Chapter-sponsored lunch at the galley on Coast Guard Island, where the group ended the day.

By reaching out to these students the Coast Guard members who participated in the tour managed to inform and educate a group that may have been previously unaware of the United States Coast Guard and its various roles and missions, and hopefully managed to inspire future generations of the guardians of our coast.




#### Lou Gertha Bonner Memorial Fund
